

There's a Psalm for This

There's a lot of things we celebrate around Epiphany Sunday. It's the end of the Christmas season and the beginning of the time in which we see the early parts of Jesus' ministry. And it's the coming of the Magi, wise men who traveled to pay homage to the infant king, Jesus. Through that aspect of Epiphany, we consider this day the time of revelation of God's chosen Messiah to all nations, not just one, because of these Gentiles who followed a star to bring gifts to Jesus.

Psalm 72:1-14, 17 (CEB)

Of Solomon.

God, give your judgments to the king. Give your righteousness to the king's son.
Let him judge your people with righteousness and your poor ones with justice.
Let the mountains bring peace to the people; let the hills bring righteousness.
Let the king bring justice to people who are poor;
 let him save the children of those who are needy, but let him crush oppressors!
Let the king live as long as the sun, as long as the moon, generation to generation.
Let him fall like rain upon fresh-cut grass, like showers that water the earth.
Let the righteous flourish throughout their lives,
 and let peace prosper until the moon is no more.
Let the king rule from sea to sea, from the river to the ends of the earth.
Let the desert dwellers bow low before him; let his enemies lick the dust.
Let the kings of Tarshish and the islands bring tribute;
 let the kings of Sheba and Seba present gifts.
Let all the kings bow down before him; let all the nations serve him.

Let it be so, because he delivers the needy who cry out,
 the poor, and those who have no helper.
He has compassion on the weak and the needy;
 he saves the lives of those who are in need.
He redeems their lives from oppression and violence;
 their blood is precious in his eyes.

Let the king's name last forever. Let his name endure as long as the sun.
 Let all the nations be blessed through him and call him happy.

Even though Jesus was promised to one section of God's people, this king was prophesied in Psalm 72 to be honored by *all* humanity, and to be a blessing to all nations. And this is what Jesus did! It didn't take long for the message of the good news of Jesus to spread from Jerusalem, to Syria, and into Greece and Italy, and finally into the whole world.

That mission hasn't changed in the millennia since Jesus' arrival either. We are still called to spread the good news of Jesus to all. One of the ways we do that is by looking out for "the needy who cry out", as the Psalm mentions. The poor, weak, and needy are all priorities for God's chosen king – and they should be our priority as well – for when we fight against oppression we fight for God's kingdom, and the world will see what the God and King we worship are like.
