There's a Psalm for This

There are a few Psalms that just make me think "how dare you talk to God like that!?" Psalm 44 is one of those psalms. It starts out fine, with a litany recalling God's deeds, but then it takes a turn. It blames all their misfortune on God's action – God abandoned them; God handed them over; it's all God's fault!

Psalm 44:1-2,4-5,8-14,17-26 (CEB)

For the music leader. A maskil of the Korahites.

We have heard it, God, with our own ears; our ancestors told us about it: about the deeds you did in their days, in days long past.

You, by your own hand, removed all the nations, but you planted our ancestors.

You crushed all the peoples, but you set our ancestors free.

It's you, God! You who are my king, the one who orders salvation for Jacob.

We've pushed our foes away by your help; we've trampled our enemies by your name.

So we glory in God at all times and give thanks to your name forever. Selah

But now you've rejected and humiliated us. You no longer accompany our armies.

You make us retreat from the enemy; our adversaries plunder us.

You've handed us over like sheep for butchering; you've scattered us among the nations.

You've sold your people for nothing, not even bothering to set a decent price.

You've made us a joke to all our neighbors;

we're mocked and ridiculed by everyone around us.

You've made us a bad joke to the nations, something to be laughed at by all peoples.

All this has come upon us, but we haven't forgotten you or broken your covenant. Our hearts haven't turned away, neither have our steps strayed from your way. But you've crushed us in the place where jackals live, covering us with deepest darkness. If we had forgotten the name of our God or spread out our hands to some strange deity,

wouldn't God have discovered it? After all, God knows every secret of the heart. No, God, it's because of you that we are getting killed every day—

it's because of you that we are considered sheep ready for slaughter.

Wake up! Why are you sleeping, Lord? Get up! Don't reject us forever! Why are you hiding your face, forgetting our suffering and oppression? Look: we're going down to the dust; our stomachs are flat on the ground! Stand up! Help us! Save us for the sake of your faithful love.

That's not how I would think to pray. Blaming God? That just doesn't feel right. But I think psalms like these give us permission to be angry in God's direction, because God can take it! It's better for us to be upset at God than to take it out on someone who doesn't deserve it. It's better to blame God for tragedies than to blame people we don't like. And being angry at God has a fortunate side-effect: it takes our focus off the thing that happened and turns us back to God. If being angry at God reminds us that God exists in a moment when we may have forgotten, that's not so bad a thing; because then God's work of healing from the tragedy can begin.


